

The Commandments for God's Liberated Children

Dear Friends,

We have crossed three months in the year 2025. We are also well into our Annual Lenten season where we concentrate on what we are leaving behind and what we gain. We spend more time on fasting, prayer, reading the Bible, meditation and helping the poor.

The Christian life is a disciplined life and that's why we are called disciples. Any disciple is expected to learn from his guru / rabbi / teacher. And the disciples are given commandments and the nature of a disciple is decided by how much a disciple can adhere to the commandments.

The Jewish people who were liberated from Egypt were given the Ten Commandments by God (Exodus 20 and Deuteronomy 5). However, Exodus Chapter 20 has to be read and understood along with Exodus 21 and 23. Reading these three chapters will provide a complete set of ordinances / case laws. For example, Exodus 21:22-25 needs to be compared with Leviticus 24:19,20 and Deuteronomy 19:21. Reading all these passages leads to an understanding that the Ten Commandments were part of legal proceedings and guidelines for judges.

Once the Israelites settled down in the promised land, the important aspects of these Ten Commandments were brought into everyday social life. These commandments helped improve personal relations between individuals, families, clans and tribes. It was on the basis of this understanding that Jesus explained the commandments of the Old Testament with a new perspective (Matthew 5:38-48).

In the early Church, spirit filled living was emphasized and Apostle Paul went on to claim that we are governed by grace and not by law. The additional information to recall and consider is that liberation was given to Israelites because they were in pain. They were slaves and they were crying to God for help. They were not expected to fulfil the commandments to earn freedom. They were given the commandments after liberation as they were entering the promised land. The people who gained freedom expressed their gratefulness and acknowledged their relationship with God by sincerely following all the Ten Commandments.

Dear Friends, following the commandments of God should be a way of life and a token of our acknowledgement to our Creator for a healthy, happy life. The Ten Commandments need not threaten us and we need not think of them as something irrelevant for us or for our times.

Follow the Ten Commandments and show the world that you are God's children.

Reviving the Ten Commandments: Remembering, Reflecting, and Responding

Dearly Beloved,

Lenten and Easter greetings to you all!

Travelling through Lent and Easter, we experience the call to repentance, renewal, and rejoicing. In the midst of our prayers, Bible reading, singing and fasting, the Ten Commandments have silently faded from our worship. They are God's everlasting guide for faithful llving. Once they were central to Christian worship, but now the Commandments have disappeared from many church services. As we celebrate the victory of Christ on Easter day, it is the right time to bring them back into our lives for ourselves, our children, and the entire church community.

1. Remember God's Word: Commandments that Call Us to Covenant Living:

The Ten Commandments represent God's covenant words. They were given to shape His people into lives characterized by faithfulness, justice, and love. These commandments remind us that we are God's chosen people, called to live differently in a world that often confuses us about right and wrong. By embracing these commandments, we are rooted in the truth of God's Word, which calls us to love God above all else and to love our neighbours as ourselves. As we celebrate Easter this month, we are reminded of the resurrection of Jesus, who fulfilled the law and guides us into a life defined by grace and obedience. God's Revelation His Ten Commandments

All religions have their own codes and laws. The Hebrew Bible has the Ten Commandments, a set of religious and ethical directives given by Yahweh directly to Moses. We need to know it's necessity and context.

The Hebrew people were slaves in Egypt for nearly 400 years. They did not have a clear revelation of God. God called Moses to go and deliver the people from bondage. Moses asked God to reveal His Name as he didn't really know the God who had called him. In reply God said *"I am who I am"*, (Exodus3:14) which in Hebrew is called YAHWEH.

Till then the people, as nomads, were living a life of their own without knowing God. They were influenced by the gods of Egypt and the gods they worshiped during their exodus from Egypt. Since God had chosen them, He wanted to purify them and gave the Ten Commandments through Moses (Exo. 20:1-17).

Some Scholars claim that Moses was greatly influenced by the Code of Hammurabi. It is true that there are some similarities. But Hammurabi belonged to the Akkadian dynasty, and lived between 1292 - 1250 B.C. whereas Moses lived in the 15th century B.C.

The Hammurabi Code has 282 rules whereas the law given by God through Moses has only 10 commandments. Moses' Ten Commandments are purely religious and personal codes whereas Hammurabi's code aimed to establish rules for social order.

The Ten Commandments can be divided into two parts. The first four Commandments talk about our duties and responsibilities to God. The other six Commandments talk about our responsibilities to the people around us.

In His teaching, Jesus summed up the Ten ommandments as two commandments. (Mark 12:29-31 and Matt. 22:37-40). These commandments show us what is most important in our lives.

The Enduring Wisdom of the Ten Commandments

1. No Other Gods – Exodus 20:3

A husband and wife disagreed about contributing funds to build a temple for their village deity. The husband wanted to contribute for the sake of harmony, but the wife reminded him of King Solomon, who lost his glory by following his foreign wives into idol worship. The Bible warns that worshipping or supporting other gods is an abomination before the Lord.

2. Idols – Exodus 20:4

Many people fail to understand that God, who is Spirit, omnipresent, and limitless, cannot be confined to an idol. The Christian life is about living by faith in the Lord. Idolatry is not just about worshipping stone statues; anything or anyone that takes God's place in our lives becomes an idol—including material possessions and technology.

3. Name – Exodus 20:7

In ancient times, scribes showed deep reverence for God's name by confessing their sins and cleansing themselves before writing "Lord." God sent His Son and named Him Jesus to save us (Matthew 1:21). After His resurrection, Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to guide us. Therefore, we must not misuse the name of the Lord, Jesus, or the Holy Spirit.

4. The Day of Rest – Exodus 20:8

A pastor, waiting for a bus, encountered a hungry man and gave him six out of his seven rupees, keeping only one for his bus fare. The man, ungrateful, asked for the last rupee as well. The pastor gave it to him and walked away. Similarly, we enjoy six days for ourselves but often take away the seventh day, which belongs to the Lord.

5. Honour – Exodus 20:12

A wealthy man displayed a large photograph in his visitor's room, depicting his parents alongside their buffalo—a symbol of their humble beginnings. Whenever guests

inquired about it, he proudly recounted how his parents worked tirelessly to educate him and instil strong moral values. Because he honoured them, the Lord blessed his business. Sadly, many families today fail to preserve and pass down the sacrifices of their ancestors to the next generation.

6. Murder – Exodus 20:13

Our life and blood belong to God, and taking another's life is a grave sin against Him. Suicide and abortion also violate His will, for we are His creation. 1 John 3:15 warns, "Whoever hates his brother is a murderer." Since the time of Abel and Cain, anger, jealousy, and desire have driven people to commit murder.

7. Adultery – Exodus 20:14

God created woman from man's rib, uniting the husband and wife as one. The Bible upholds the principle of one man for one woman. Jesus said, "Whoever looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery in his heart." Adultery, promoted through media, distances us from God. Our bodies are temples of God; let us keep them holy.

8. Stealing – Exodus 20:15

A thief stole money and carried it in a bag. A kind police officer, unaware of the theft, offered him a ride. Seeing the police, the thief panicked and ran, proving that even if no one sees our wrongdoing, our own conscience will convict us. Never steal, for God sees everything.

9. False Testimony – Exodus 20:16

We must not justify lying, as God detests a lying tongue (Proverbs 6:17). False testimony is wrong in both the law courts and daily life. Peter denied Jesus, but his conscience pricked him. Honesty may bring hardship but Truth endures. Let us speak truthfully and uphold honesty.

10. You Shall Not Covet – Exodus 20:17

Covetousness is excessive desire. When our focus shifts to accumulating and spending beyond our needs, it leads to breaking other commandments. The key to overcoming covetousness is generosity, which stems from love. The fruit of the Spirit begins with love and ends with selfcontrol. Let us align our desires with God's will and cultivate contentment.

The Ten Commandments provide enduring wisdom that guides us to live righteously, honour God, and love our neighbours. May we reflect on these principles daily and strive to walk in obedience to God's Word.

The Ten Commandments – Purpose and Practice

In the first instance, God Himself wrote the Ten Commandments on two tablets of stone with His finger, as a covenant, and gave them to Moses (Exo.31:18; 32:15-16). But when Moses saw the golden calf and the people dancing around it, he threw the tablets down and broke them (Exo.32:19). But in the second instance, Moses had to write the words of the Ten Commandments on the tablets as a covenant (Exo.34:28).

- 1. Purpose: The purpose of the Ten Commandments is to live a moral and a holy life pleasing to God. Theologians have often divided them as the first table and the second table, based on Jesus's words in Matthew 22 about the two greatest commandments. The first table had four commandments pertaining to the relationship with God (no other gods; no graven images; do not bear the Lord's name in vain; keep the Sabbath) and the second tablet had six commandments dealing with various relationships, family, and society (honour your father and mother; do not murder; do not commit adultery; do not steal; do not bear false witness; do not covet). One scholar says that they might be called rules of 1. religion, 2. worship, 3. reverence, 4. time, 5. authority, 6. life, 7. purity, 8. property, 9. tongue, and 10. contentment.
- 2. Failure of the first covenant: According to Jewish tradition, there were about 613 commandments, which included the ten commandments and other laws of Moses such as

ceremonial laws (Deut.33:4). This was called 'the first covenant', because it was inaugurated with blood. (Exo.24:8, Heb.9:18). But the people could not follow them. The Bible says, "For whoever keeps the whole law and yet stumbles at just one point is guilty of breaking all of it." (James 2:10, NIV). Also, it brought a curse on those who could not observe and obey all the things written in the book of law (Gal.3:10).

- 3. Whether the first covenant was abolished: Jesus says, "Do not think that I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I have not come to abolish them but to fulfil them." (Matt.5:17, NIV). It should not be confused with the Mosaic law. Moses wrote down all the words of the LORD and it is called as 'the book of the covenant' (Exo.24:4,7); whereas, the law spoken by Moses to the people, were written by Moses and it is called as 'the book of the law' (Deut.31:24,26). It is mentioned as Moses law in New Testament (Matt.19:7-8; Mark 10:2-5; Matt. 22:24-30; Mark 12:18-25; Luke 20:27-36; John 7:22-24; 8:3-9; Acts. 13:39; 15:5; Rom.10:5; 1 Cor.9:9; Heb.10:28). Only the law had been abolished by Jesus (Eph.2:15) after fulfilling them (Matt.5:17), but the Ten Commandments remain standing. Apostle Paul also insists on the importance of commandments over the law (1 Cor.7:19).
- 4. Jesus fulfils the law and gives the reward to us: The Bible says, "For Christ is the end of the law so that there may be righteousness for everyone who believes." (Rom.10:4, NRSV). Earlier, the righteousness could be obtained only by fulfilling the law. But Jesus fulfilled the law (Matt.5:17) and inherited the righteousness. He redeemed us from the curse of the law (Gal.3:13) and gave the righteousness to those who believe Him.
- 5. Is it necessary to follow the ten commandments? Many times, Jesus insists on keeping the commandments (Matt.19:17; 22:40; Mark 10:19; 12:29-31; Luke18:20; John 14:15, 21; 15:10). In fact, He condensed the Ten Commandments into two saying, "You shall love the Lord

your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." and "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." He added, "On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." (Matt. 22:37-40, NRSV).

- 6. Blessings of obeying the commandments: The commandments give eternal life (Matt.19:16-17), and are honey (Ps.119:103), light (Ps.119:105), a treasure (Ps.119:14,72,127,162), freedom (Ps.119:45), a source of great joy (Ps.119:14). They save us from misery (Ps.119:92), and lead us to inherit the Kingdom of God (1 Cor.6:9-10). If we obey His commandments, then we will receive from Him whatever we ask (1 Jn.3:22).
- 7. Practice: Earlier, the Ten Commandments were written on stone, that too, the one which was written by God was broken. But now, according to the new covenant, it will be written on our hearts (Jer.31:31-33; Heb.8:10) and on our minds (Heb.10:16) and the spirit of God will make us to follow His statutes and to observe His ordinances (Eze.36:27).

Ezra had set his heart to study the law of the LORD, and to do it, and to teach the statutes and ordinances in Israel. (Ezra 7:10). Let us ask God, *"Teach me to do your will, for you are my God. Let your good spirit lead me on a level path"* (Ps.143:10, NRSV). Amen.

Know Your Seniors

Dr. Nirmala Reuben, a former member of our church family who carried the love of Christ with quietness and perseverance to many outside the church, including those in Government Protection Homes for Women and Remand Homes, shares her experiences with us.

Praise be to the Lord! I am Dr. Nirmala Reuben. In 1978, after my marriage to Mr. Reginald Reuban who worked in the Highways Dept in Trichy, we became members of St. John's Church. Our sons Joel, Noel and Royal grew in their faith attending Sunday School and Youth Fellowship in this church.

My elder son Joel was a cross bearer till he moved to Chennai for work and we shifted to Chennai after our retirement. We now worship at CSI St. Thomas Garrison Church in Chennai.

Both my great grandfathers Rev. R. J. Rajamani, Chennai and Rev. N. G Ponniah, Mannargudi, were CSI presbyters. My father Late Mr. A. T. David Johnson who worked in the Income Tax Department was an active member of Christ Church, Fort, Trichy.

I grew up in Chennai and moved to Trichy in 1973. From childhood I loved to give whatever possible to those in need. In Trichy, there were a row of huts occupied by needy people behind my grandfather's house. When my grandmother took a nap, I would quietly give them small quantities of rice or firewood from our house if there was nothing else to give. My father always encouraged my giving.

I was brought up in a strong Christian faith and God used me as an instrument to serve in His Kingdom in many different ways. Initially I worked in the Methodist Girls' High School. I completed my BA, MA and M Phil after marriage. I also completed my PhD on Theological Education and Ministry. I was blessed to serve in various departments in the CSI Trichy Tanjore Diocesan office for more than three decades from 1982 to 2014. I retired as the diocesan chaplain.

During his first term at St. John's, in 1983, Rev. Josephus Jeyaraj introduced us to prison ministry. A group from our church visited the Government Protection Home for Women once a month. He suddenly asked me to give a message to the women there. I was unprepared and trembling when I spoke, praying in my heart that the Lord should speak to each of the women present there. Before we left, the Superintendent, Ms. Marudhambal, held my hand and said that God had spoken to her through me. I was only 23 then. She asked if I could come once a week and speak to the inmates. When she got transferred to Madurai, she asked if I would visit the Madurai home. That is how over the years I was given permission to visit all the Government Homes for women and the remand homes for juvenile delinquents all over Tamilnadu. Last year, members of the Women's Fellowship of this church visited the Women's Protection Home.

Members of our church have come with me to the remand home for boys in West Boulevard Road and to the one in Thanjavur when we conducted games for them. I was also appointed as a member of the Juvenile Justice Board – Observation Committee by the Collector along with a lawyer and a judge. Last year, the TN Government honoured me with an award when the Ministry for Sports conducted a sports meet for juvenile delinquents in Thanjavur.

Compassion has always been at the core of our hearts. We joined forces with like-minded friends and family doing what we could within our means to support the underprivileged and the needy.

After keenly observing our efforts, my cousin Mrs. Sheela Navamani and her husband Dr. Navamani shared this with our uncle. When Uncle George Joseph and Aunty visited India, they witnessed first-hand what we were striving to accomplish. It was then that they encouraged us to start a Trust, urging us to expand our services to impact a larger community. Their faith in us and continuous guidance inspired us to take a bold step forward, and thus EDEN Charitable Trust was born. My uncle's generosity and vision were instrumental in turning our dream into a reality.

EDEN is an acronym for 'Educate, Develop, Elevate the Needy'. With God's help and a sincere zeal to serve the needy, the trust has since grown from its humble beginnings, backed by the unwavering support and patronage of those committed to sharing resources with the underprivileged.

Mr. A.T. David Johnson, Retired Income Tax Superintendent, was the Trust's very first donor. He continues to contribute generously from his pension every month. His selflessness is a testament to the spirit of giving that drives our mission. We are grateful to members of St. John's who have been partners in our mission.

The Lord does more than what we ask or imagine. As we now complete 27 years of service, we are humbled to share that we have impacted the lives of needy children, women and senior citizens in unimaginable numbers. We feel encouraged and our commitment only grows stronger each day.

I thank the Almighty for His grace to continue this mission to serve His children and fulfil His purpose of my life.

Coveting in a # Hashtag World

"You shall not covet" (Exodus 20:17) is a timeless commandment that reminds us not to envy others. In today's world of social media, this commandment is more relevant than ever as we often compare our lives with the curated images and stories we see online.

I am an avid social media user. Being connected to social media almost 24/7, both for personal and professional reasons, I have come to realize how it can influence my thoughts and emotions. While it is great for connecting and finding inspiration, it can also lead to envy and dissatisfaction. The Bible warns against the destructive nature of envy. "A heart at peace gives life to the body, but envy rots the bones." (Proverbs 14:30)

Coveting is more than just admiring something; it is a feeling of longing, or jealousy toward others' possessions, relationships, or status. This steals our peace. Social media can fuel unhealthy comparisons by showing us the best parts of people's lives—vacations, achievements, and material things — while hiding their struggles and imperfections. This constant exposure can lead to feelings of inadequacy or longing for things we do not have.

Advertisements and influencers add to the pressure by projecting standards of beauty, or creating a desire for lifestyles and luxuries we might not need. Distinguishing between genuine needs and fleeting wants requires selfcontrol. James reminds us, "You desire but do not have, so you kill. You covet but you cannot get what you want, so you quarrel and fight. You do not have because you do not ask God" (James 4:2). Instead of seeking happiness in material things or comparisons, we should turn to God for fulfillment.

Living without envy in today's world to obey the commandment, "Do not covet" requires a change in perspective. St. Paul teaches us to find contentment in every

situation (Philippians 4:11,12). Being thankful for our blessings and staying focused on our journey can help us avoid unhealthy comparisons.

Social media shows just a part of the story. Everyone, even those who seem to 'have it all', face hidden struggles and challenges. Instead of envying others' achievements, we can use them as motivation for personal growth while sincerely celebrating their successes.

Practical Tips

- Spend less time on online platforms, particularly accounts that fuel negative feelings. "Guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it" (Proverbs 4:23). Block, mute, or unfollow pages that don't support your mental health.
- 2. Follow only accounts or pages that foster personal growth and feelings of thankfulness.
- 3. Write down every positive thing that occurs in your life, no matter how minor, as a way to cultivate gratitude.
- 4. Build genuine connections by spending time with loved ones in real life (offline) to strengthen relationships.

By focusing on gratitude and contentment, we can resist the temptation of envy. Scripture promises, *"Take delight in the Lord, and he will give you the desires of your heart"* (Psalm 37:4). When we align our desires with God's will instead of chasing a curated online identity, we find peace and fulfilment in the blessings that come from Him.

God's Ten Commandments

In the Old Testament period when Israel escaped slavery in Egypt, Moses was God's chosen leader and he prayed to God for help. God giving Moses the Ten Commandments is part of Israel's history and spiritual journey (Exodus 20: 2-17 and Deutronomy 5: 6-21). These commandments are a list of religious precepts directly revealed to Moses by Yahweh and were engraved in two stone Tablets which are called the 'Decalogue'.

God helps us in many different ways to live a moral life. He gives us grace, which awakens in us the desire to say 'no' to temptation and sin and to choose only that which is good. He gives us theological and cardinal virtues and the grace to practice human virtues so that we can grow stronger in them.

There are many things in our lives that can gain precedence over God. We can place our careers, our possessions, our relationships, and our own desires ahead of Him. When we do this, we are essentially saying that those things are more important to us than God.

But He should be our foremost priority. When we make Him the centre of our lives, everything else falls into place.

In our lives today, it can be hard to find time for rest. We are always busy and always on the go. But it is important that we make time for God each week and each day, even if it feels like sacrificing some of our free time. When we do this, we honour Him and show that He is our first priority.

A Moral Framework

Outreach Ministry Report - January - March 2025

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ! By His grace and through your prayers and support, we continue our outreach ministry on the fourth Saturday of every month. Nearly sixteen members from our congregation actively participate in this village ministry. The villages visited were:

In each village, we begin by visiting individual homes, distributing tracts, and praying with those who are willing. We also invite them to join us at a common gathering place. During these sessions, both children and adults come together for the Gospel sharing and a film presentation. Local pastors and village elders coordinate the arrangements.

For the children, we teach Bible verses through songs and stories, making the learning experience engaging. Following the film screening, we conclude with individual prayers for everyone present.

We humbly seek your prayers for government support in providing essential facilities such as shops, public transportation, schools, and access to clean drinking water in these villages. Please also pray for our follow-up ministry and for opportunities to reach more villages in Trichy District.

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to our pastors and the pastorate committee members for their support. Special thanks to Mr. Anbu and Mr. Ponner for their invaluable assistance. Since 2018, we have reached 46 villages, and we continue to seek God's guidance to expand this mission.

Key Budget Proposals - Financial Year 2025-26

- 1. There was no change in the tax rates under the Old Tax Regime but the tax rates under the New Tax Regime u/s 115BAC have been proposed as follows: Total Income up to Rs. 4,00,000 Nil Rs. 4,00,001 to Rs. 8,00,000 5% Rs. 8,00,001 to Rs. 12,00,000 10% Rs. 12,00,001 to Rs. 16,00,000 15% Rs. 16,00,001 to Rs. 20,00,000 20% Rs. 20,00,001 to Rs. 24,00,000 25% Above Rs. 24,00,000 30%
- In the New Tax Regime, the threshold limit of Total Income for Rebate U/s 87A has been increased from Rs.7,00,000/- to Rs.12,00,000/-, (that is, no tax up to an income of Rs.12,00,000/-). The maximum rebate amount has been raised from Rs. 25,000 to Rs. 60,000.
- 3. Individuals opting for the New Tax Regime are not eligible for section 87A rebate on income chargeable at special rates (e.g., Tax on capital gains under section 111A/112/ 112A, etc.)The threshold limit for TDS on interest income received by senior citizens from banks, co-operative societies and post office accounts is increased from Rs.50,000 to Rs.1,00,000. For such interest received by persons other than senior citizens, the limit is increased from Rs.40,000 to Rs.50,000.
- 4. The threshold limit for TDS on Rent is increased from Rs.2,40,000 to Rs.50,000 per month or part thereof.
- 5. The threshold limit for TDS on professional fee is increased from Rs.30,000 to Rs.50,000.
- 6. The threshold limit for TCS on outward (Foreign) remittance under LRS (Liberalized Remittance Scheme) and overseas tour program package is increased from Rs.7,00,000 to Rs.10,00,000.

The TCS rate on foreign remittance for higher education, financed by loan from financial institutions is reduced from 0.5% to 0%

7. The time limit for filing updated returns (if individuals have not previously filed returns) is proposed to be extended form 2 years to 4 years.

The Old Rugged Cross - The Story behind the Hymn

George Bennard was born in Youngstown, Ohio, in 1873. His early days were carefree, but when his father died, Bennard became the family provider, working in deep, dangerous coal mines. His life was tough but he knew he had to keep going for his family.

After many difficult years, three great things transformed Bennard's life: he found a wife named Ariminda, got a job at Salvation Army, and, best of all, became a Christian.

Bennard became a minister, and also wrote many hymns. Many disappeared with time, but 'The Old Rugged Cross' outlived him and continues to be sung to this day.

For a time, he had the tune but the lyrics remained elusive. This brain block lasted months, and all Bennard could settle on was the line 'I will cherish the old rugged cross.'

Bennard put the unfinished hymn aside for some months as he travelled across Michigan to preach sermons. The sermon tour renewed Bennard's appreciation for the sacrifice on the cross. When he returned home, he tried once again to write the lyrics for the tune. This time, the lyrics came to him easily. Before long, he was calling Ariminda from the kitchen and singing the completed hymn for her. 'The Old Rugged Cross' was finally finished and ready for the world.

Quitting is extraordinarily tempting when things get hard, but those that persevere are rewarded.

Bernard's perseverance, learnt at a young age, helped him in the writing of this hymn, now sung worldwide. If he had thrown away an unfinished hymn with lyrics that wouldn't come to him, the world would be short of one of the all-time greats – 'The Old Rugger Cross'.

After his father's demise he and his wife decided to convert the car porch into a bath attached bedroom for her. His brand new Innova was parked on the road. Their faith did not teach them the Ten 'C's but they were exemplary in obeying the fifth.

A retired college professor visited a former colleague. He found a shelf full of books that had been borrowed from the college and department libraries and not returned. Both of them knew the Ten 'C's since childhood. The former recalled the eighth commandment. Apparently, his friend had not thought it applicable to books!

When our children were in school and I worked outside the home, weekdays were busy and Sundays busier, leaving us exhausted. Later we made changes, some of which we could have followed earlier. Now with Sunday's menu planned and prepped ahead, Saturdays are busier, but Sunday's food is no longer a hassle. Giving our helper the day off on Sundays frees us too.

God commanded rest to enjoy His goodness. "Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy ... On it you shall not do any work, ... neither your manservant or maidservant ..." (Exodus 20:4).

Some, especially those in the medical field, are committed to work on Sundays. Jesus healed several people on the Sabbath and said, "... it is lawful to do good on the Sabbath" (Matthew 12:12b).

When Jesus condensed the Ten 'C's into two, He narrated the Good Samaritan story to explain the second commandment. He also redefined the Ten, defining God's standards of purity, honesty, integrity and love.
