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From the Desk of the Presbyter Incharge ...

Praise and Thanksgiving

"Praise the Lord" and "Alleluia" are common terms we use in worship, prayers and even while greeting each other. The book of Psalms uses these terms many times. The important rendering of the term in the New Testament appears in the book of Revelation.

The concept is simple and basic but vital to the believer. Let 'God's name be praised' is an affirmation of many things. God is the creator. I am a created being like many other beings around me. God is to be magnified and others are subordinates. God is immortal and we are not. God is to be worshipped and others are be respected – not worshipped. Any image, idol, force, power, being or human is not God and cannot be venerated the way we venerate God. Many times we see a sad state. Political leaders and people of power, matinee idols, sports personalities and even church leaders are worshipped as if they were God. This is pure idolatry.

The nature of God is revealed in the Bible and taught to us from our birth at various forums. The Church teaches us to be strong in understanding the nature of God by a systematic instruction of Theology. The liturgy we follow, the songs we sing and the prayers we offer must focus on the eternal, omnipotent and omnipresent God. People must use appropriate words when uttering words of praise to human beings, who are in power. No mortal being can be equated to God. People who cross this line are selfish and do it for their own good. This is blasphemy and I have seen it happening more often in recent times, both within the Church and in society.

Why should we praise God?

1. Because God revealed himself to us: Scripture states, "And without controversy great is the mystery of godliness: God was manifest in the flesh, justified in the Spirit, seen by angels, preached unto the Gentiles, believed on in the world, received up into glory" (I Timothy 3:16 KJV). This verse highlights Jesus Christ's

- divine nature, His human embodiment, His public ministry, and His eventual glorification, which is a central tenet of Christian belief.
- 2. Because He is going to return: Scripture also states, "Which in His times He shall shew, who is the blessed and only Potentate, the King of kings, and Lord of lords; who only hath immortality, dwelling in the light which no man can approach unto; whom no man hath seen, nor can see: to whom be honour and power everlasting. Amen" (I Timothy 6:15,16).
- 3. The Mystery of salvation is given to us: St. Paul is very clear about this. "Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, that they too may obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. Here is a trustworthy saying: If we died with Him, we will also live with Him; if we endure, we will also reign with Him. If we disown Him, He will also disown us; if we are faithless, He remains faithful, for He cannot disown Himself" (I Timothy 2:10-13).

The above quotes are only basic important New Testament claims made by Paul. We can give endless reasons for praising God.

Thanksgiving in the Old Testament was an important aspect of faith for the Israelites. They were nomads, shepherds and unaccepted by their neighbours, wherever they went. God accepted them as his own people and made known to them, "I am your God and you are My people". God led them, freed them, gave them the land, water, safety and blessings. Their worship creed was simple but very authentic "The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it".(Ps24:1.) Another classical example from the OT is the Bible reading we read in our Thanksgiving festivals – Deuteronomy 26:1-11.

The story of the patriarchs gives us a glimpse of how God was a reliable provider, mighty protector and the promised redeemer. Even though they were a minority community, God gave them peace and stability. The people of God were

reminded often to bring thanksgiving to God. This acknowledgement was vital in uniting the people and to remain faithful to the Lord God. Read Deuteronomy 8:17,18.

The best example in the gospels is Luke 17 where Jesus acknowledges and appreciates the gratitude of the Samaritan healed of leprosy. The act of thanksgiving is a mark of a true believer and enhances the faith and quality of life and inculcates hope for the future.

Praise looks at the person of God / Christ. Thanksgiving looks at the gifts of God / Jesus.

Praise God and bring your thanksgiving to his Holy presence.

Praise and Thanksgiving

"Enter His gates with thanksgiving and His courts with praise" (Psalm 100:4)

- "Give thanks in all circumstances" (I Thessalonians 5:18)
- "Do everything in the name of the Lord with thanksgiving" (Colossians 3:17)

Ways to Practise Praise and Thanksgiving: There are many simple ways to practise praise and thanksgiving daily. These verses remind us that thanksgiving is not only for good times. It is for every season of life.

- · Pray every morning and thank God for a new day.
- Sing songs that lift His name and celebrate His goodness.
- Read the Bible and meditate on His promises.
- Help others and show kindness as an act of thanksgiving.
- · Write down blessings in a journal and review them often.
- · Speak words that encourage and build others up.

These habits make thanksgiving a lifestyle, not just an occasional act.

The Blessings of a Thankful Heart: A thankful heart brings peace and joy. It teaches us to be content with what we have. It helps us face challenges with courage and hope. Thanksgiving is infective. When we are thankful, we inspire people around us to be thankful too. It creates a community of love and kindness.

Conclusion: Praise and thanksgiving are powerful gifts. They remind us of who God is and what He has done. They change our hearts and draw us closer to Him. By making thanksgiving part of our daily life, we live with more joy, peace, and faith. A life of praise and thanksgiving is a life filled with God's love.

Why We Need Both Praise and Thanksgiving

Praise and thanksgiving are central themes throughout the Bible, reflecting a heart that acknowledges God's greatness, faithfulness, and provision. Though often used together, they serve distinct yet interconnected purposes in the believer's relationship with God.

1. What is Praise?

Praise is the expression of admiration and reverence toward God for who He is — His character, nature, and glory.

- Psalm 145:3 "Great is the Lord, and greatly to be praised, and his greatness is unsearchable."
- Hebrews 13:15 "Through Jesus, therefore, let us continually offer to God a sacrifice of praise—the fruit of lips that openly profess his name."

Praise is not dependent on circumstances; it focuses on God's attributes — His holiness, sovereignty, mercy, love, and power. Even in suffering, believers are encouraged to praise.

 Habakkuk 3:17-18 – Even though the prophet sees no signs of provision, he says, "yet I will rejoice in the Lord, I will be joyful in God my Savior."

2. What is Thanksgiving?

Thanksgiving is the expression of gratitude to God for what He has done — His blessings, deliverance, guidance, and provision.

- 1 Thessalonians 5:18 "Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus."
- Psalm 100:4 "Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise! Give thanks to him; bless his name!"

Where praise is about **who God is**, thanksgiving is about **what God has done**. Together, they form a complete expression of worship.

3. The Spiritual Power of Praise and Thanksgiving

Biblically, Praise and Thanksgiving are not just Spritual disciplines- They are also powerful acts of faith and warfare.

- 2 Chronicles 20:21-22 Jehoshaphat sends out singers to praise the Lord ahead of the army, and God brings victory.
- Acts 16:25-26 Paul and Silas praised God in prison, and their chains were loosed.

These examples show how praise and thanksgiving shift focus from human strength to God's power. They realign the heart to trust Him, even in the darkest circumstances.

4. Thanksgiving as a way of life

The Bible encourages continual thanksgiving — not just as an act, but as a **lifestyle**.

- Colossians 3:17 "And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him."
- Philippians 4:6 "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God."

Thanksgiving reminds believers of God's past faithfulness and encourages trust for the future.

Conclusion: Praise and thanksgiving are essential expressions of a heart aligned with God. Praise honors who God is; thanksgiving honors what God has done. Together, they cultivate joy, strengthen faith, and invite the presence of God.

As the psalmist declares:

"I will bless the Lord at all times; his praise shall continually be in my mouth." (Psalm 34:1)

Sthothram!

A pastor explained in his sermon how we should lift our petitions to God with praise. The essence of what he said is this: when we pray for something, we should pray with the faith that we have already received it. We must kneel, raise our hands, and praise God. The word 'Stothram' (praise) should be recited with full devotion, with our whole heart and mind, and with complete faith and trust, saying it continuously for a minute, as though we have already received what we asked for. He said that when we pray with praise in this way, our faith will be strengthened, and we will experience the assurance that we will receive what we ask for.

Scripture says, "Let us lift up our hearts along with our hands to God in heaven" (Lamentations 3:41).

Last month, we had planned a trip to Ooty. After making plans and booking train tickets, we made all the necessary arrangements. However, in the last week of June, we were warned of heavy rains in places like Valparai, Pollachi, Coimbatore and Ooty, and a red alert was issued. As a result, my relatives in Pollachi advised us to reconsider our trip to Ooty. Since many had already planned their travels, we decided that the only option was to pray for favourable weather. With four days remaining, I resolved to follow the pastor's advice: to wake up early, praise God, and pray with the belief that we would be blessed with favourable weather. I praised God with full faith for the next four days and then travelled to Ooty. By God's immense grace, there was no rain in Coimbatore or Ooty on the day we travelled. The trip was a blessing. People said that it had rained heavily as soon as we left Ooty. Glory to God's name!

Our God dwells in the midst of praise. King Jehoshaphat defeated his enemies—the Ammonites, the Moabites, and the people of Mount Seir—by sending singers ahead of his army, who praised God saying, "Give thanks to the Lord, for His love endures forever" (2 Chronicles 20:21).

The book of Psalms often shows that after presenting a petition, the psalmist ends with praise and thanksgiving. God says, "He who offers praise glorifies Me" (Psalm 50:23). The word "praise" appears more than 50 times in this book.

Even after losing everything, Job praised God, saying, "The Lord gave, and the Lord has taken away; may the name of the Lord be praised" (Job 1:21)

Apostle Paul, in his writings about prayer, emphasized the combination of joy, supplication and praise. He instructs us to "Rejoice in the Lord always" and not to worry about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, to present requests to God (Philippians 4:4-6). When we are in distress, we often pray with tears, but Paul encourages us to pray with thanksgiving, without worry. He urges us to "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18). He also advises us to ""Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer" (Romans 12:12).

Therefore, only those who maintain a constant joy in their hearts can pray without ceasing. They are the ones who can offer praise with the unwavering belief that their petitions have already been granted. So, when you present your requests to God in prayer, begin praising Him immediately. Rest assured, you will receive what you've asked for.

How Not to Worship

When we gather for worship, we often ask, "What pleases God?" But Scripture also warns us about ways of worship that fall short. To understand true praise, we must be honest about how not to worship.

1. Worship that's all show

Jesus cautioned against those who pray or give just to be seen by others (Matthew 6:1–5). Worship becomes empty when it is more about performance than God's presence. Singing loudly or lifting hands is not wrong—but if it's done

to impress rather than to honour the Lord, it has lost its heart. Worship should flow from humility, not pride.

2. Worship without obedience

Isaiah rebuked Israel for offering sacrifices while ignoring God's commands for justice and mercy (Isaiah 1:11–17). To sing hymns on Sunday yet walk in disobedience on Monday is a contradiction. Praise cannot be divorced from daily faithfulness. God delights in a life aligned with His will more than in well-polished liturgy.

3. Worship that ignores others

Paul reminded the Corinthians that their gatherings were chaotic and self-centred (1 Corinthians 11, 14). They thought they were worshipping, but their lack of love for one another spoiled it. True worship is corporate—it builds up the Body. If we sing beautifully yet refuse to forgive a brother or sister, we are missing the mark.

4. Worship without engagement

Jesus said the Father seeks those who worship "in spirit and truth" (John 4:23). Half-hearted mumbling of prayers or distracted drifting during the Eucharist is not the worship God desires. It is possible to go through the motions without offering our hearts. Worship calls for attentiveness and honesty before God.

5. Worship that treats God lightly

Leviticus tells of Aaron's sons who offered "strange fire" before the Lord and were struck down (Leviticus 10:1–3). This is a stark reminder: worship is not casual entertainment. We approach a holy God. Reverence does not mean stiffness—it means remembering who God is and why He is worthy of awe.

Worship is the highest calling of the Church, but it is not defined by music styles, length of services, or outward forms. It is defined by truth, humility, obedience, and love. Let us beware of worship that is shallow or self-centred, and instead offer God the praise of hearts fully turned to Him.

Prison to Praise

'Prison to Praise' is the autobiography of Merlin Carothers, an American soldier who had to spend time in prison for desertion from the Army. While in prison he came into a living relationship with Jesus Christ. He discovered the power of praise, which transformed his life. He went on to be an army chaplain and later on started the "Foundation of Praise" a ministry focussed on teaching people to praise God in every situation. In his book, he says, "Praise is based on faith not on emotions".

What are the spiritual secrets of praising God?

1. It's the will of God

1 Scripture says, "Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:18). A faithful believer will try to please God by seeking to do His will always.

2. It's a spiritual weapon

Jehoshaphat's army praised God before the battle, and God caused their enemies to be defeated (Chronicles 20:21-22). Paul and Silas prayed and sang hymns in prison, and an earthquake opened the doors (Acts 16:25-26). Praising God gives victory over fear and challenges.

3. Praise puts our eyes on God's greatness

"I will bless the Lord at all times; his praise shall continually be in my mouth (Psalm 34:1) "Through Jesus, therefore, let us continually offer to God a sacrifice of praise" (Hebrews 13:15).

When we praise God in difficult situations, our primary focus shifts to God from our problems and this gives God the opportunity to solve our problems.

4. God is enthroned in our praises

"Yet you are holy, enthroned on the praises of Israel" (Psalm 22:3). The psalmist experienced God's presence manifesting in a special way as a king enthroned when he praised Him.

Every believer is called to give God the throne of his life, his family, his workplace, his church and the best way to do it is through our praises.

What are the spiritual benefits of praising God?

1. Replaces discouragement with gratitude:

God gives "the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness" (Isaiah 61:3). Praise is presented as an exchange therapy where heaviness and fear are replaced with joy. If we are going through tough times the best solution is to start praising God.

2. Releases spiritual authority:

"Faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see" (Hebrews 11:1). When we have true faith we continue to praise God even before a breakthrough, demonstrating our confidence in His assurance.

3. Opens our eyes to see hidden opportunities for growth in trials:

"We know that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him ..." (Romans 8:28). Praise keeps us positioned to see God working for our good even in difficulty.

God commands our praise in all circumstances, and He promises to work all things for our good, So praising Him even in hardship is an act of obedience and faith that unlocks His power on our behalf.

The Heart of Praise and Thanksgiving

"Give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5:18).

Praise and thanksgiving are at the very center of the Christian life. They are not optional extras but vital expressions of our faith. When we pause to reflect, we realize that every breath, every blessing, and even every trial comes under the loving care of our Heavenly Father. Gratitude and praise lift our eyes from ourselves and turn them toward the greatness of God.

Praise is the joyful recognition of who God is. The psalmist declared, "Great is the Lord and most worthy of praise; His greatness no one can fathom" (Psalm 145:3). In praising God, we remember His majesty, holiness, and mercy. Praise reminds us that our God is sovereign, faithful, and unchanging, no matter what our circumstances may be. It is not limited to songs in a

church service — it is the posture of a heart that delights in God daily.

The Heart of Praise and Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving flows from remembering what God has done for us. "Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good; His love endures forever" (Psalm 107:1). When we give thanks, we acknowledge God's hand in our salvation, His provision, His protection, and His countless mercies. The discipline of thanksgiving guards us against grumbling and forgetting His goodness. It shifts our focus from what we lack to the abundance of grace we have already received.

It is easy to give thanks when life is smooth. The true test comes in seasons of hardship. Yet Paul urges us to "give thanks in all circumstances" (1 Thessalonians 5:18). This does not mean ignoring pain or pretending all is well. Rather, it is an act of trust — believing that God is good even when life is difficult. Consider Paul and Silas, singing hymns of praise while in prison (Acts 16:25). Their joy was rooted not in their comfort but in Christ. When we choose gratitude in trials, we proclaim that our hope rests in the Lord, not in our situation.

A life filled with praise and thanksgiving transforms both the believer and the community. St. Paul assures us that thanksgiving in prayer brings the peace of God, which guards our hearts and minds (Philippians 4:6-7).

A grateful congregation becomes a joyful congregation. Praise and thanksgiving unite us, lift our spirits, and shine as a witness to the world that our God is worthy of honor.

How can we cultivate this spirit? By making thanksgiving a daily practice — pausing to name our blessings, lifting songs of praise even in the quiet of our homes, and sharing testimonies of God's faithfulness. As we do, gratitude becomes more than words; it becomes a way of life.

Reflection

Lord, give us hearts that overflow with praise and thanksgiving. Teach us to trust You in every circumstance, to rejoice in Your goodness, and to live as witnesses of Your enduring love. Amen.

Know Your Elders

Mr. Raj Thilak, who spends more time in church than most of us, is quick to greet every member and newcomer. He volunteers as the church photographer and is a longtime bass singer in the choir. He is the new Secretary in the Pastorate Committee. He shares his life experiences with Johanan Eric Mathuram.

Johanan Eric Mathuram: Uncle, tell us about yourself.

Mr. Raj Thilak: Since my father was the Headmaster of a Government High School, he used to get frequent transfers and my siblings and I were schooled in different places. I completed my SSLC in Bishop Heber High School, Teppakulam, in 1968. I completed my degree in Madurai Wakf Board College, and my Masters in Sociology and B.Ed. in Chidambaram University. I joined BHEL in 1977 as an Administrative Assistant. Later I completed my MBA (HR) and served in various departments. I retired as Chief P&A in 2012. My wife Mrs. Vanitha retired as a Government Higher Secondary School teacher. My married daughter Rency lives in Chennai and our son Renato works as Risk Analyst for Canadalife. We are also blessed with a granddaughter.

JEM: How did you come to attend St. John's, Uncle?

Mr. RT: In 1983 some of us moved to various churches and I came to St. John's. Though the atmosphere was different from the earlier one, Presbyters like Rev. P.D. Peter, Rev. David Christudoss and others guided me. They invited me to attend cottage prayer meetings and also involved me in the administrative matters of the church. Incidently, they were the ones who conducted my marriage in 1989 at Sirkazhi. My wife was also always supportive of my involvement in church ministries.

JEM: When did you begin singing in the choir?

Mr. RT: Earlier, for the Passion Music and Carol services, a combined choir was conducted by Mrs. Jane Noble. Later in the eighties, when Rev. Rayan Samuel served as a Presbyter

in our Church, he mobilized all the youth and initiated the move to have our own choir. From then on, our choir has been led by Mr. Edwin Selvadoss, who also nurtured my interest in singing. He used to invite me for church events and trained me to sing.

JEM: Can you tell us about your faith journey, Uncle?

Mr. RT: In my childhood days I was not much attracted towards the church. It was my parents' compulsion that took me to church then. Even during my college days, I was only a seasonal Christian. After joining BHEL, I was led by the spirit of God through one Mr. S. Joseph, who got me involved in church activities. He used to meet me regularly and share his experience about God. On Sunday evenings he would take me to nearby villages for village outreach programmes. He took me to the FMPB Annual camp at Danishpet every year and also got me involved in church prayer groups. I felt the spirit of God slowly working in me. Later I joined the singing ministry at BHEL Church.

EJM: What has been the most difficult moment in your faith journey and how did God help you through it?

Me: There were times when I felt discouraged and lonely following some events in my life. But nothing has deterred me from trusting in the Lord. I used to bow down to the will of God. He knows what to do, and when and how to do things that are needed in my life. With God's help, I hope to continue my journey of faith and in serving Him. I feel the presence of God has sustained me in every area of my life.

EJM: Uncle, we know that you do not live nearby. How do you always manage to come for services ahead of time?

Mr. RT: Earlier we lived in BHEL Nehru Nagar Township which is 16 km away but I was always keen on coming to church on time. Now we live in Nagamangalam which is 16 km away. Even for choir practices I could not be late. Arriving ahead of time for services has given me personal satisfaction. May our ever loving Father continue to bless me with the strength and dedication to exalt His name in my life.

EJM: As the new Secretary, do you have any plans that you would like to share with us?

Mr. RT: Holding a position in church administration has never been in my mind. I'm always interested in serving the Lord through His church. I humbly accept this as the will of God. We have a competent Chairman and a committee eager to serve the church. Since our church has become a Cathedral, we have to give a facelift to the building. We are planning to concentrate on proper documentation and transparency in every matter. The matter of encroachment on our church land is pending for the past several decades. Clearing it still remains a distant dream. God willing, we have to do something on this and a prayer hall has to be built. The Hymn and the Hymnwriter

'Now Thank We All Our God' is a beautiful hymn usually sung during 'Thanksgiving' services. Our hearts overflow with gratitude as we sing 'O may this bounteous God, through all our life be near us'. We recall the many blessings received from the hands of our loving Heavenly Father.

When I went through the words of this hymn, I thought that it must have been written by someone blessed with everything he wished for. But it was not so.

Martin Rinkart, a German Lutheran Pastor, wrote this hymn around 1636, during a period of intense suffering and loss. A thirty-year war (1618-1648) fought primarily in Germany, was one of the most destructive conflicts in European history. It began as a religious conflict between Protestants and Catholics, within the Roman empire and escalated into a devastating war involving Germany, France, Sweden, Spain and Denmark.

Pastor Rinkart lived in the walled city of Eilenburg in Germany. Political and military fugitives landed there causing overcrowding, deadly pestilence and famine. War victims sought refuge in the Rinkart home. Pastor Rinkart provided food and shelter even when he was hard pressed to provide for his own family.

In 1637, during the peak of a severe plague, Rinkart was the only surviving pastor in Eilenburg, conducting as many as fifty funerals in a day. He performed more than 4000 funerals during that year, including that of his own beloved wife. Despite his personal tragedy and the devastation around him, Rinkart's hymn reflects a profound sense of thankfulness to God.

Pastor Rinkart wrote this hymn in German and Johann Cruger composed the tune. Catherine Winkworth translated it into English.

The hymn's enduring popularity lies in its simple, yet powerful message of gratitude for God's blessings in all circumstances and even in the face of extreme adversity.

There is a verse in a hymn that goes this way:

'Every day, the Lord Himself is near me
With a special mercy for each hour;
All my cares He fain would bear, and cheer me,
He Whose Name is Counselor and Power;
The protection of His child and treasure
Is a charge that on Himself He laid;

"As thy days, thy strength shall be in measure," This the pledge to me He made.'

The Lord is with us in all our present circumstances. Our gratitude to Him for the present day, the hour, the minute and the second enriches our faith and helps us grow in a stronger and deeper relationship with Him. Today is a gift and a blessing from God. We can count God's blessings — waking up in the morning, sipping coffee with the family around us, enjoying the sights and sounds of nature that surround us, a song that consoles our souls — the list would go on.

Thanking God for the future:

Thanking God for the future is nothing but absolute faith. St. Paul writes, "And my God will supply every need of yours according to His riches in glory in Christ Jesus." Always, in Everything, in All Circumstances

Praise and thanksgiving are the duties of Christians. God expects these two things from us. When we praise God, we are fulfilling the purpose of creation.

"Praise' and 'Thanksgiving' go together. Praise is worshiping God for who He is and thanksgiving is expressing gratitude to God for all He has done and all He has given us.

1. Praise:

- a) Definition: The Hebrew root word for praise means to shine, to boast, to celebrate, and it is the root of the word Hallelujah. It also means extended hand, to throw out the hand, and lifting God up. Another definition by Daniel Forster is, to sing, to tell of, to give, or to confess and in simpler terms, to be thankful for God's blessings, to declare that good news to God and to others, and to proclaim the glory of God. Topical Encyclopaedia says, praising God is the act of expressing admiration, gratitude, and reverence towards God.
- b) Biblical Context: God is enthroned on the praises of Israel (Psalm 22:3, NKJV). All the Old Testament sacrifices are abolished except the sacrifice of praise. The Bible says, "...let us continually offer to God a sacrifice of praise, the fruit of lips" (Hebrews 13:15). Dr. Joseph R. Nally, Jr., says, there are seven types of praising, and they are, giving thanks, raising hands, kneeling, singing with instruments, shouting praises, and singing spontaneous songs. King David was praising God in every situation. When he was driven away by Abimelech, he sang, "I will extol the LORD at all times; his praise will always be on my lips" (Psalm 34:1). Job praised God, even when he lost his children and all his belongings. (Job 1:21). Daniel prayed and gave thanks to God, just as he had done before, even when he learned that a decree to trap him had been published by the king (Daniel 6:10).

c) Benefit: Praise has more power. Praise gives victory and deliverance from afflictions and bondages. When the people of Judah began to sing and praise, the Lord set ambushes against the men of Ammon and Moab and Mount Seir who were invading Judah, and they were defeated. (2 Chro. 20:22). When Paul and Silas prayed, and sang praises unto God, the prison doors were opened, and everyone's bands were loosed. (Acts 16:25-26, KJV).

1. Thanksgiving:

- a) Definition: Thanksgiving means, expression of gratitude or appreciation to God. According to Topical Encyclopaedia, "Thanksgiving refers to the act of expressing gratitude to God for His blessings, provision, and grace. In the Old Testament, thanksgiving is often associated with offerings and sacrifices. In the New Testament, thanksgiving is a recurring theme in the teachings of Jesus and the writings of the apostles."
- b) Biblical context: Apostle Paul insists, "in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God." (Phil.4:6) and "Continue steadfastly in prayer, being watchful in it with thanksgiving." (Col.4:2). God expects hearts of gratitude. When Jesus healed ten lepers, only one among them came back, praising God in a loud voice. Jesus asked him, "Were not all ten cleansed? Where are the other nine?" (Luke 17:15-18). The Bible scholar Chuck Smith says, "The leper received more than just the healing of his leprosy. He received salvation."

The Bible says, "give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." (1 Thes. 5:18) and "always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Eph. 5:20). The Bible says, "all things work together for good" (Romans 8:28). So, whatever things happen in our lives, all are according to God's will. Nothing will happen in our lives without the knowledge of God (Job 1:12; 2:6; Luke 22:31; Matthew 10:29-31). By giving thanks for

every good and bad thing, we are acknowledging or accepting God's will in our lives. A godly man says, thanksgiving is not only a response to God's actions but also a reflection of a heart aligned with His will.

c) Benefit: Jesus took the five loaves and gave thanks even before the miracle took place. (John 6:11). Because of this, the loaves were multiplied and there was a great blessing for all. Daniel prayed and gave thanks to God, just as he had done before, even when he learned that a decree to trap him had been published by the king. (Daniel 6:10). God rescued Daniel from that trap.

David says, "What shall I return to the Lord for all his goodness to me? I will lift the cup of salvation and call on the name of the Lord" (Psalm 116:12-13). Godly man Matthew Henry states the meaning of gratitude as, "God, having bestowed so many benefits upon me, whatever cup he shall put into my hands I will readily take it, and not dispute it; welcome his holy will."

The Bible says, "Let everything that has breath praise the Lord. Praise the Lord" (Psalm 150:6). Amen.

The Habit of Praise and Thanksgiving

Habits shape the way we live. Just as brushing our teeth keeps our mouths clean, the habit of Praise and Thanksgiving keeps our hearts clean and close to God. Yet a common question arises: If praise and thanksgiving are supposed to come from the heart, why should we practise them? Doesn't practice make it fake?

When children are taught to say "Thank you," at first it may feel like mere words, but gradually they learn genuine gratitude. Just like practising kindness or forgiveness, practising praise and thanksgiving doesn't make it fake—it makes it real.

The Bible reminds us, "Give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5:18). Some days gratitude flows easily, other days we're discouraged or tired. On those days, practice keeps us anchored. By deliberately giving thanks, even when our feelings are weak, we gently remind our souls of God's truth. Over time, this habit transforms us.

How to practise praise and thanksgiving:

Start the Day with Gratitude: Don't wait for big breakthroughs to be thankful. Each morning, begin by thanking God for at least three blessings your life, your health, your family, or simply the gift of a new day. These small acts of gratitude set the tone for a joyful heart.

See God in Everyday Moments: A flower blooming in the garden, the beauty of a sunset, or the song of a bird all these can become moments of worship. Let creation lead you to the Creator.

Reflect Compliments Back to God: When others compliment your talent, wisdom, or character, let it become a moment of worship. Say "Praise be to God, for He is the one who gave me this gift." As James reminds us: "Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights" (James 1:17).

Turn Complaints into Praise: This does not mean thanking God for every problem, but thanking Him in every situation. We can rest in the truth that He is with us, and He has the power to turn even challenges into blessings.

Over time, the habit of praise and thanksgiving changes us:

- · Worry is replaced with peace.
- · Joy replaces complaining.
- · Our eyes are opened to see God's hand in everything.

That is why Paul writes, "Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice" (Philippians 4:4).

Back in Exodus days, the Israelites grumbled and complained even after manna rained from heaven. As we often do with inconveniences, delays, denials or even monotony in our lives.


